


## **60th Anniversary of the Edmund Pettus Bridge Crossing**

## MORRIS BROWN COLLEGE LAUNCHES FIRST COAST GUARD CSPI PROGRAM AT AN ATLANTA HBCU

ATLANTA (August 14, 2025) – Morris Brown College has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) agreement with the United States Coast Guard to officially partner through its College Student Pre-Commissioning Initiative (CSPI).

The CSPI program is a prestigious scholarship and leadership development initiative designed for students who aspire to become Coast Guard officers. It provides a unique opportunity to earn a college degree while gaining valuable real-world experience and a guaranteed path to Officer Candidate School (OCS) upon graduation.

Open to highly motivated students enrolled full-time in a bachelor's degree program at Morris Brown College, the CSPI program is ideal for those who demonstrate strong academic performance and a commitment to service. Selected students between the ages of 19 and 27 will be enlisted as active-duty Coast Guard members with the rank of Officer Trainee and will receive full military benefits including salary at the E-3 pay grade, housing allowance, medical, and dental. Moreover, as part of the program, CSPI scholars will have their tuition, books, and fees covered annually while they complete their degree. Upon graduation, they will attend the Coast Guard's intensive 12-week Officer Candidate School and subsequently begin their careers as commissioned officers. This partnership underscores Morris Brown College's commitment to expanding career pathways for its students and supporting service-oriented leadership.

"We are thrilled to partner with the United States Coast Guard on this groundbreaking initiative," said Dr. Kevin James, President of Morris Brown College. "This program provides our students with an incredible opportunity including a fully funded college education, hands-on leadership training, and a direct pathway to a prestigious career serving our nation. It's a gamechanger for those seeking purpose, service, and success."

Senior Executive Service member, Scott Lanum, Director U.S. Coast Guard Civil Rights Directorate, emphasized the significance of the partnership, "The CSPI program is crucial for recruiting the best and brightest talent into our future officer ranks. By investing in educational initiatives and career pathways now, we ensure that our future leaders are well-prepared to meet the challenges of tomorrow. Our partnership with Morris Brown College exemplifies our commitment to nurturing future talent and enhancing our service."

Morris Brown College, founded in 1881 at Big Bethel AME Church by freed slaves, is a testament to African American resilience and empowerment. It remains the only college in Georgia founded, funded, owned, and operated by African Americans. After nearly 20 years of dedicated efforts, the college regained full accreditation through the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS) on April 26, 2022, marking a pivotal moment in its history.

#### About Morris Brown College

Morris Brown College was founded by formerly enslaved religious leaders at Big Bethel AME Church in 1881, and it is the first college in Georgia to be owned and operated by African Americans. The iconic Fountain Hall and the current Morris Brown campus are where Dr. W.E.B. Du Bois wrote The Souls of Black Folk in 1903. Notable alumni include Alberta Williams King, mother of Martin Luther King, Jr., and James Alan McPherson, the first Black writer to win a Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

## So Doctor, you said I have what?

On April 19th, 2020 my life changed as I knew it. Nothing could prepare me for the news and I didn't ever think it could happen. Ever since I lost my father in 2006 to prostate cancer I was a big advocate for men to check and be checked. If you can find it early your chances of beating it improves greatly. Every year I had my annual visit with my doctor and tests done so I'm feeling great about my chances. So when I had a small injury to my chest trying to carry out an old recliner I would never have thought that the diagnosis would be Stage 3 Breast Cancer. Yes, that's what I said... Breast Cancer.

What's not often mentioned in many advertisements or promotions for Breast Cancer is that men are also subjected to it. There is very little shown or told about men's Breast Cancer because it's normally found in women and it's a top killer to them. I also believe that men refuse to seek help for so many health issues so why spend the money on getting the information out for something that affects only 1 in every 833 men? But wait, Breast Cancer in men is more fatal than in women. This is due to a lack of adequate treatment and later diagnosis were just part of the factors. It was also found that differences in clinical characteristics (e.g., tumor type and stage, age at diagnosis, type of treatment) accounted for 63% of the mortality disparity. Let's say this... Men don't check for Breast Cancer. What percentage of men survive breast cancer?

The five-year relative survival rate for men with breast cancer overall is 84%. This means men with breast cancer are 84 percent as likely to live five years beyond their diagnosis as men in the general population. When the cancer is localized, the five-year survival rate is 96%

What Are the Symptoms?

A lump or swelling in the breast.

Redness or flaky skin in the breast.

Irritation or dimpling of breast skin.

Nipple discharge.

Pulling in of the nipple or pain in the nipple area.

#### "So Doc what's next for me?"

Because of the cancer's stage and aggressive growth a radical chemo treatment was recommended. This consisted of 4 powerful drugs administered by an artery port and several shots and pills at home. This immediately changed my body chemistry. It was hair loss and I couldn't hold food. Many days I wanted to give up but I had the best therapist I could get, my wife's, and my daughters checking on me daily both inspiring me to keep going. Then there was the surgery where I had to have a complete mastectomy and removal of 21 lymph nodes from my left side. All this and now Radiation every day for 6 weeks where my strength declined. Oh yeah, just to add, this started in June 2020 during the pandemic and I still attempted to work every day because just sitting around would have done me worse. I can't continue without saying Thank you to my Brothers of Carrollton Lodge #57 and some co-workers who supported and checked on me often. I missed many of my Masonic meetings and although it wasn't understood by everyone I missed the fellowship.

Me now, well I continue to fight this Cancer and do not plan on ever just giving in to it. There is a daily regimen of over 12 pills needed for continued pain and prevention. The meditation and daily prayers give me strength and keep my mind strong. And the hope to hear that all is good and live. But mostly I plan on telling my story so others can learn and have a better understanding of Men and Breast Cancer.

## Reflecting on my time as WM



In December 2019, Friendship Lodge #20 elected me to serve as WM for the year ensuing 2020. I demitted into this lodge in 2018 and was elected Junior Warden for 2019. Since I was already a Past Master, having served as WM at Silver Leaf Lodge No. 457 in 2012 and 2013, I was happy to bring my experience to the role and assist. It was surreal to be Elected WM and become one to serve in that role in two different lodges. My Agenda was simple, "The Building." I initially had a vision of gradually fixing up the lodge where it was needed, BUT GOD had other plans. In March of 2020 we were in a Pandemic and to add insult to injury a storm caused our ceiling to fall in. I learned the ceiling had fallen in because my DDGM called me and told me that a Past Master in my Lodge saw fit to let him know before letting me know. We reopened the Lodge hall after having been closed for 2 years, except for our bi-weekly Zoom calls, and got right to work in the community to make a difference. I would be re-elected two more times for a total of five times and when it was all said and done, I had made fourteen new Master Masons and received four demits for a total of eighteen new members on my watch. I have never felt so accomplished or confident that I made a difference and left my mark. Five years sounds like a long time, but I am here to say that it flew by because my Brothers made it easy to be me. My Brothers were always there to encourage me when I needed encouragement. My Brothers made it a pleasure to be their Worshipful Master.
